Interesting, believable characters are an essential part of any good story. To create such characters, an author can use a variety of methods.

Study these methods and examples before going on to the activity.

- 1. Describing physical appearance—Embedded in Ma Diller's fat, fleshy face were two tiny, raisin-like eyes.
- 2. The actions of the character—Scratching at herself, Ma searched the cupboard for something to eat.
- 3. The thoughts of the character—I think I'll sleep all day again, decided Ma.
- 4. What the character says—"You rotten kids get in here, or I'll come and whomp you with my broom!" screamed Ma from the doorway.
- 5. What others say to or about the character—"Ma is the laziest old woman in the world," the boy sneered.

- 6. What others do to the character—Under the kitchen table, Elmer gleefully tied the laces of Ma's work boots together.
- 7. The setting in which the character is found—The whole place was a mess, particularly the front yard, which was littered with trash and old furniture. Asleep on a rotting old sofa lay the snoring bulk of Ma Diller.
- 8. The author explains what the character is like—For Ma, breathing in and out was a big job in itself and anything beyond that, impossible.
